## Canada adds 83,000 jobs, driving unemployment rate down

Canada's labour market topped expectations and added 83.1K (-0.4%) jobs in June, the first significant gain since January. Growth was concentrated in part-time work (+70K; +1.8%).

The employment rate increased by 0.1% to 60.9%. The rate had previously recorded a cumulative decline of 0.3% points in March and April and had held steady in May.

Employment increased in both the private (+47K; +0.3%) and public (+23K; +0.5%) sectors, while the number of self-employed workers was little changed.

Employment rose among core-aged (25 to 54) men (+62K; +0.8%) and core-aged women (+29K; +0.4%). There was little change among youth and people aged 55+.

The unemployment rate ticked down to 6.9%, the first decrease since January.

There were 1.6M unemployed people, little changed in the month but up 128K (+9.0%) year-over-year. More than one in five (21.8%) have been searching for work for 27 weeks or more, up from 17.7% in June 2024.

The unemployment rate for returning students – those heading back to school in the fall – was 17.4%, up from 15.8% in June 2024. This was the highest unemployment rate for returning students since 2009, excluding pandemic years.

Employment increased in wholesale and retail trade (+34K; +1.1%), as well as in health care and social assistance (+17K; +0.6%) but declined in agriculture (-6K; -2.6%). There was little change in other industries.

Employment increased in Alberta (+30K; +1.2%), Quebec (+23K; +0.5%), Ontario (+21K; +0.3%) and Manitoba (+8.5K; +1.2%), while it declined in Newfoundland and Labrador (-3.5K; -1.4%) and Nova Scotia (-3.4K; -0.6%).

Average hourly wages increased 3.2% (+\$1.10) to \$36.01 year-over-year.

A Reuters poll of economists heading into Friday's release predicted the jobless rate would rise to 7.1% and employment would remain flat.
